Memorial Day Shoot

I know that we are probably preaching to the choir, but we need to remind all of the work involved in putting on the 36th Annual Memorial Day Shoot and Rendezvous. This truly is a labor of love and it takes all of us to make it happen.

Be prepared for no open fires!!! While

there is

a state-wide Stage 1 fire ban in place right now, no word has been received that we will have to cancel our shoot. Plan that there will be no open fires and everyone will need a fire bucket and shovel in their camp. If you have a weed sprayer, fill it full of water and bring it as well. We will be our own fire crew on site.

Come with your gloves and your gumption and help us set up on Friday, May 27th. We be setting up 3 tents, pounding posts, stretching wire, hanging celotex, hauling targets, and working to get ready for the event. The more of us that show up and do this, the less work for everyone involved.

On Saturday and Sunday, take a little time and help work on the range, in the tents, on the shooting line, and wherever you can spare a few rninutes. TIDBITS OF INFORMATION

RENDEZVOUS......

In 1822, Missourian William Ashley formed a partnership with Alexander Henry and recruited a brigade of about a hundred trappers to ascend the Missouri to its source and trap beaver. While the new enterprise suffered setbacks, it eventually made Ashley a wealthy man and in 1826 he retired to run successfully for Congress.

In 1823, Ashley's keelboats were attacked by Arikara Indians on the Missouri in present South Dakota; fourteen trappers were killed. This convinced him to re-supply his trappers in the mountains and pick up their furs by overland caravan following the Platte River across Nebraska.

On July 1, 1825, Ashley's caravan met his trappers on Randavouze Creek in southwest Wyoming. For sixteen years, until 1840, the annual rendezvous became a time to sell the catch, buy supplies, have fun, and count the dead. Usually more friendly Indians than trappers attended the gatherings, which sometimes lasted for two weeks.

BLUE LODGE ON THE GREEN......

Many of the mountain men and most of the leaders were members of the Ancient, Free, and Accepted Masons. Special Masonic swords were sent to at least one rendezvous, and the fraternity probably had secret meetings during the festivities.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN COLLEGE......

During the months of bivouac in winter quarters, there was time for sports and games. Men learned to read and write, and others shared their knowledge of history, languages, religion, literature, and science with their friends. One beaver trapper referred to this time as his having attended "Rocky Mountain College".

Shakespeare, Burns, the Bible, and books on history, mathematics, geography, and botany, were available during the mountain man era. Many mountain men packed a book or two with them on their travels.

The rendezvous were times of gambling, drinking, racing, and feasting. Green Rio (South American) coffee, roasted in a pan and then pounded and boiled, sugar in cones, and rare spices such as cloves, peppercorns, and allspice added to the festive fare of the celebration. Hailstorms, mint juleps, shrubs, and bounces pleased the palates of those who preferred alcoholic beverages.

In 1821, the forty-year rivalry for control of the Canadian fur trade between the Hudson's Bay Company, headquartered in London, and the Montreal-based North West Company came to an end when the two firms merged into a great monopoly. The executives of the HBC were impressed with the quality of goods the NWC had been trading across Canada.

The HBC had supplied its customers with sturdy, good-quality English flintlock trade arms knows as North West guns and identified by the brass serpent side plate, large iron guard, and light 2.4 gauge smoothbore barrels. The North West Company, doing some if its business with progressive mixed blood people, known collectively in Canada as Metis, provided the usual North West guns, but also sold what were termed "fine guns". The NWC inventory of trade goods turned over to the new HBC included: 440 North West guns; 15 neat fowling pieces, brown barrels to take out with false breech, ribs, roller locks, neat steel furniture; and 15 Do. Do. Platina (touch) holes, twisted (Damascus) barrels. These were all apparently made by Thomas Barnett of London. Platina was an early term for platinum, a then-rare metal that did not corrode.
