Jay Rathman presented a very interesting discussion on his Hall breech-loading flintlock rifle. Mr. Hall began designing his rifle in 1781 and perfected it in 1811. The Marine Corps was the first official users of this gun and it cost \$17.50 complete with bayonet and accessories. The field trials for this rifle in 1825 had it shooting 1,198 rounds at 100 yards rapid fire off-hand in ten minutes with 430 hits, a 36% accuracy, beating all others. Very interesting report and seeing the gun was also great. Thank you Jay!!!

A LITTLE GUN HISTORY

In 1929 the Soviet Union established gun control. From 1929 to 1953 about 20 million dissidents unable to defend themselves, were rounded up and exterminated.

In 1911, turkey established gun control. From 1915 to 1917, 1.5 million Armenians unable to defend themselves, were rounded up and exterminated.

Germany established gun control in 1938 and from 1939 to 1945, a total of 13 million Jews and others who were unable to defend themselves were rounded up and exterminated.

China established gun control in 1935. From 1948 to 1952, 20 million political dissidents unable to defend themselves, wee rounded up and exterminated.

Guatemala established gun control in 1964. From 1964 to 1981, 100,000 Mayan Indians unable to defend themselves, were rounded up and exterminated.

Uganda established gun control in 1970. From 1971 to 1979, 300,000 Christians unable to defend themselves, were rounded up and exterminated.

Cambodia established gun control in 1956. From 1975 to 1977, one million educated people unable to defend themselves, were rounded up and exterminated.

Defenseless people rounded up and exterminated in the 20th century because of gun control: 56 million
