DECEMBER PAPER PISTOL MATCH

Five of us shot pistol on December 5, enjoying some really good shooting weather! Had some new faces which makes the match more interesting! The scores were:

Steve was the only one shooting a flint. Jim shot a practice target after the match, scoring 90. Larry practiced with an 1851 Colt Navy, whose sights were WAY off (maybe four feet at 25 yards), so he shot the match with my target pistol - - - not the first time that I've been beaten with my own gun. Just shows that the problem is not with the gun......

Things everyone else already knew.....

Before filing down a front sight, I paint the back of the blade red, use a knife to scrape off the paint above my best guess to the correct height. Using the top of the red paint as a sighting point, I fire a few shots to test my guess and repeat the process until the sights are dead on. Then start filing the sight down to the top of the red paint!

Tom Faux taught me that the wedge carrying the front sight is "one way" - - - it is tapered left-to-right so it is easier to drive out if you know the taper and the barrel must be on something solid which will not absorb the blow to drive the sight wedge out.
